## How to become @POTUS

* Win the electoral college
$>$ Must win 270 of the potential 538 electoral votes (majority)


## Line of Succession

> Set up by 25th Amendment
> VP, Speaker of the House, President Pro
Tempore, Cabinet members

## Vice President

* Duties:
$>$ Serve as President if President is not fit
$>$ President of the Senate
- Only votes when tie
- Not actual member
- Doesn't partake in debates
$>$ NOTHING ELSE!!!!!!
"I am Vice President. In this I am nothing, but I may become everything." -John Adams

## Roles/Hats and Powers of the President



## Chief of State:



* Symbol, role model, and
 inspiring leader of the American people
> Throwing first pitch of a baseball game
$>$ Welcoming visitors to the White House
$>$ Giving out awards



## Chief Executive:

* Make sure laws passed by Congress are carried out
$>$ Nominate federal judges, ambassadors, agency heads, etc
> Issue executive orders
> Pardons, reprieves, commutations
* In charge of Federal

Bureaucracy
> 15 Cabinet departments
$>$ Executive Office of the President
> Independent Agencies
$>$ Regulatory Commissions
$>$ Etc.

## Legislative Leader:

* Influence lawmaking of


## Congress

> Propose legislation
$>$ Signing/vetoing bills
> State of the Union
Address/report to


Congress
$>$ Propose a budget

## Commander in Chief:

* Head of Armed Forces
> Final say in planning war
$>$ Meets with Joint Chiefs of Staff
$>$ Ordering military strikes

- But not war
$>$ Nuclear codes
* War Powers Resolution (1973)- must notify congress within 48 hours; troops can't stay longer than 60 days



## Chief Diplomat:

* Author and leader of foreign policy
$>$ Makes treaties/alliances
- NATO
$>$ Meets with foreign leaders

$>$ Appoints ambassadors and diplomats
$>$ Foreign Aid
- Marshall Plan



## "Guardian of the Economy":

* Helps country to prosper economically
$>$ Proposes federal budget
$>$ Creates new programs to put money into the economy
- New Deal
> Power in appointment
$>$ Meets with business leaders and economic advisers



## Party Leader:

* Expected to direct his/her party
$>$ Endorse fellow party members
> Give speeches in support of other party members
$>$ Raise money for party
> Appoint party members to
 high positions
